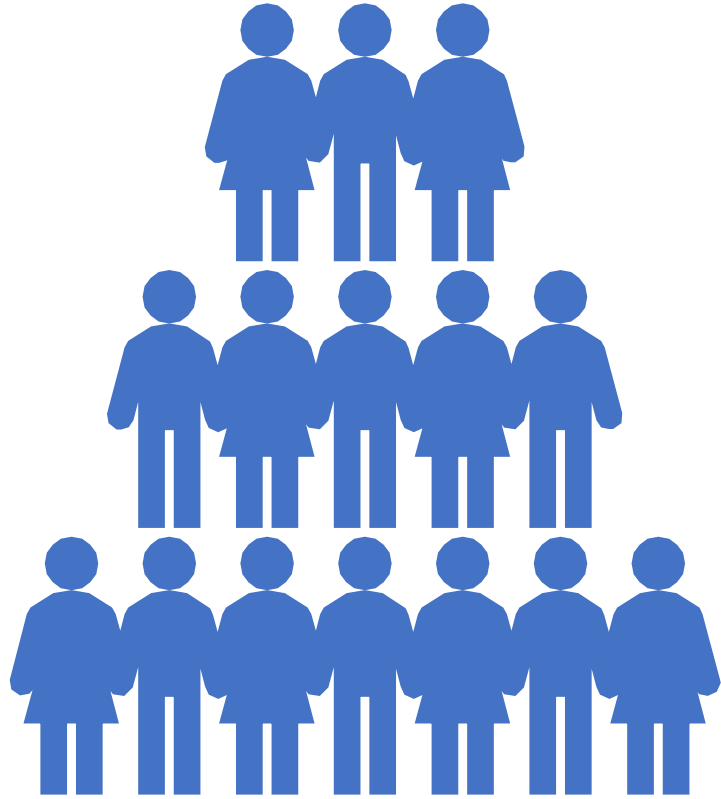

- Brings people together who have related interests and gives them the opportunity to learn from each other (Hill, 1985).



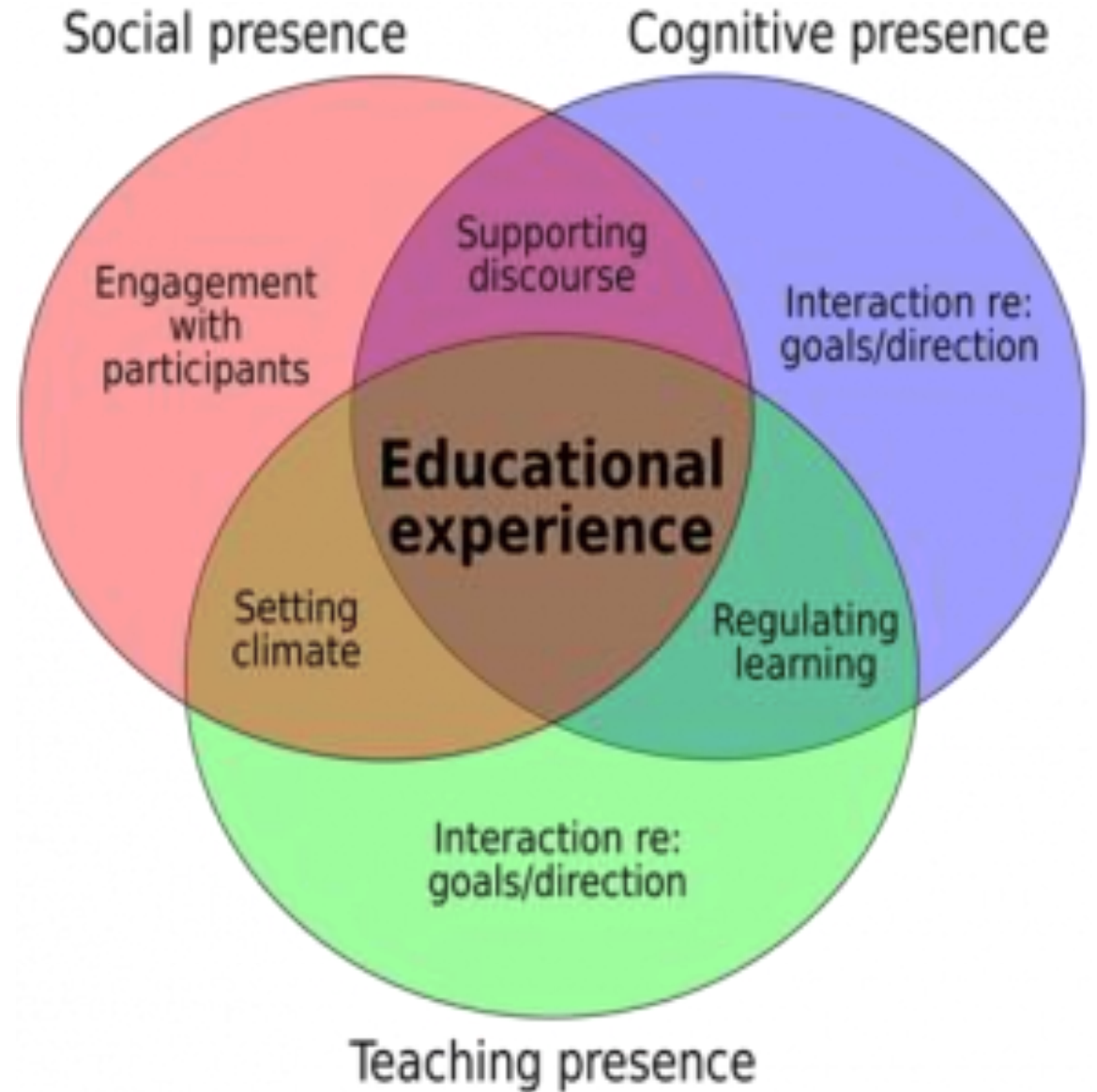
