

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


### What is Microlearning?

## Definition of Microlearning

 Microlearning is a way of teaching and delivering content to learners in small, very specific bursts. The learners are in control of what and when they're learning (Eades, 2014).






### Goal-Based Learning

Each microlearning session, event or task must have established, clear goals (Cheng, Watson, & Newby, 2018.)





### History and Structure of GEMs

#### History of GEMs

- Inspired by Will deBock's Innovation Lab, Great Emerging Methods (GEMS) was founded by Ellen Manning in 2008 as part of her work as an IL Fellow.
- Faculty applied as IL Fellows and applications were peerreviewed. Fellows received a small stipend to explore new technologies.
- GEMs is and always will be her legacy. She is deeply missed and her memoriam can be found here.



#### **Initial Concept of GEMS**

"GEMs sessions were created to be a way for faculty to be able to share best practices they were using in their classrooms in an easy, low-threshold, collaborative way."

#### **GEMS Structure**

- Offered through CTL Live Events
- Proposed topics come from faculty and staff
- Invited speakers
- Coordinated by Liz and Laurie of the CTL
- Hosted by team of faculty "gemologists" who brainstorm ideas, plan sessions, create the slides, and present
  - 2-4 learning outcomes per session
  - Emphasis on improving teaching, using new technologies, achieving wellness immediately applicable ideas

#### **GEMS Live Session Description**





Bring a GEM, take a GEM!


